




















<p><b>White Dead-nettle</b> These do not sting. One of the best flowers for early emerging Bumblebees.</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Common</b></p>	<p><b>Red Dead-nettle</b> These do not sting. Smaller than the White Dead-nettle and are found on more disturbed ground</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>	<p><b>Garlic Mustard</b> Very small flowers at the top of the plant. Characteristic leaf shape. A food plant of Orange-tip and other white butterflies</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Common</b></p>	<p><b>Lesser Celandine</b> Nearing the end of flowering so may only be easy to find in more shaded places.</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>

<p><b>Dove's-foot Crane's-bill</b> Small flowers just opening. Grows close to the ground and the leaf shape is key. Found on disturbed ground.</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>	<p><b>Native Bluebell</b> Flowers hang down on one side of the stem. Petals curve back on themselves at the end of the flower tube</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Abundant</b></p>	<p><b>Hybrid/Spanish Bluebell</b> Upright with flowers all round the stem. Bigger leaves. Petals bent out at the end of the flower, but not curved back</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>	<p><b>Red Campion</b> Tall plant that has a long flowering period. Mostly pollinated by moths and occasional Garden Bumblebee</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Common</b></p>

<p><b>Honesty: Red variety</b> Large plant, can grow to 100cm. A garden escape that can be used by caterpillars of some of our white butterflies</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>	<p><b>Honesty: White variety</b> Large plant, can grow to 100cm. A garden escape that can be used by caterpillars of some of our white butterflies</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>	<p><b>Herb Robert</b> Grows close to the ground. Stems and leaf edges are often bright red. Has a strong smell when touched.</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>	<p><b>Cowslip</b> Almost at the end of flowering but it can be found in our wildflower restored areas at Crow Wood Bank and Heritage Viewpoint</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Scattered</b></p>

To help identify a Flower also look closely at the Leaf Shape

 <p><b>Bird Cherry</b> You have to look up to find these flowers. They are on a medium sized shrubby tree. <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Hawthorn</b> Just coming into flower. Shrub of woodland edges. Leaf shape is also a characteristic. Not all in flower. <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Rowan</b> Just coming into flower. Leaves are an important characteristic with several leaflets with saw toothed edges <b>Common</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Gorse</b> A very spiky leaved shrub. Characteristic of open dry areas and can dominate and exclude other plants. <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>
 <p><b>Shining Crane's-bill</b> Very small flowers. Grows close to the ground and the leaves are glossy. Found on disturbed ground. <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Creeping Buttercup</b> The commonest of the Buttercups. The leaves are characteristic and often close to the ground <b>Common</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Daisy</b> Only grows well where grass is short. Flowers only open when it is bright and warm and they follow the sun <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Wood Avens (Herb Bennet)</b> Looks a bit like a buttercup, but petals separated when flower is open. A medium tall plant that grows around edges of woodland <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>
 <p><b>Cow Parsley</b> Tall plant with many tiny flowers grouped together at ends of branching stalks. Leaves finely divided. <b>Common</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Bird's-foot Trefoil</b> Flowers similar to Gorse, but without any spines and grows very close to the ground on dry banks. <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Field Forget-me-not</b> Grows to around 20cm tall on path sides and dry places. <b>Scattered</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>	 <p><b>Wetted Thistle</b> Will soon be in flower. Often very tall (up to 2m) very spiny thistle. Flowers much used by Bumblebees and Butterflies <b>Scattered becoming Common</b></p> <p>Tick when found</p>

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
