Oxeye Daisy

Large white daisy, just starting to flower. Found in both our restored wildflower areas. Good for Hoverflies and Solitary Bees

Kidney Vetch

Same family as Bird's-foot Trefoil, but with clusters of paler yellow flowers. **Only** found around the Heritage Viewpoint

Field Scabious

Just coming into flower. Found in our restored wildflower areas. Very attractive to Bumblebees and Butterflies

Foxglove

Greatly benefitted from ivy clearing. An important flower for just two of our Bumblebee species.

Charlock: Easy to find with its mass of yellow flowers. Food for caterpillars of Green veined and Small White Butterflies

Common Stork's-bill

Low to the ground. Leaf shape characteristic. Look on path edges, especially at Heritage Viewpoint

**Poppy:** One of the most recognizable of the Cornfield Annuals. Few in flower at the moment, but by July there should be many more

Yellow Rattle: Short, upright flower. Look on the flat area next to the wall below Crow Wood and on the bank behind the seat at Heritage Viewpoint

Viper's Bugloss: Best seen at the Heritage Viewpoint. Still manages to flower even in drought. Important for bumblebees

Ragged Robin: Very few plants of this relative of Red Campion. They can be found around the Heritage Viewpoint seating area

White Campion: More drought tolerant than Red Campion. Only found on the wildflower areas. Moth pollinated

**Star of Bethlehem:** This flower is **Only** found in Bathing House Wood, two clumps on the wood side of the path where it runs parallel to the shore
